What does LGBTQIA+ Mean

Let's Break This Down

L-	Lesbian	Women who are attracted to their own sex
G-	Gay	Men who are attracted to their own sex
B-	Bisexual	Men or women attracted to either sex
T-	Trans	Someone whose gender differs from the sex they were assigned at birth
Q-	Queer	An umbrella term simply meaning anyone who identifies as part of the LBGTQIA+ community
I-	Intersex	Intersex: General term used for a variety of conditions in which a person is born with a reproductive or sexual anatomy that doesn't seem to fit the typical definitions of female or male.
Α-	Asexual	Is the lack of sexual attraction to others or low or absent interest in or desire for sexual activity.

Sexual Orientation

Sexual Orientation refers to an individual's enduring pattern of emotional, sexual, and romantic attraction.

Gender Identity

Gender identity is an individual's innermost concept of self as male, female, both or neither. A person's gender identity can be the same or different than one's sex assigned at birth. Here a list of gender identities.


Cisgender: Person who identifies with the sex assigned at birth.

Transgender: Person who does not identify with the sex assigned at birth.

Transsexual: Person who has had either hormone treatment and/or surgeries to align themselves with the gender they identify as.


Gender Fluid: Person may at any time identify as male, female, neutrois, or any other non-binary identity, or some combination of identities. Gender which varies over time.

Gender queer: Denoting or relating to a person who does not subscribe to conventional gender distinctions but identifies with neither, both, or a combination of male and female genders.

Intersex: General term used for a variety of conditions in which a person is born with a reproductive or sexual anatomy that doesn't seem to fit the typical definitions of female or male.


A Little More About Intersex

Being intersex is a naturally occurring variation in humans and it is not a medical problem.





LGBTQ Youth Population in The United States

- 3.2 million of youth aged 13 to 17 identify as LGBTQ.
- Of the 3.2 million 52% are people of color
- These numbers represent that 9.5% of the population of youth Identify as LGBTQ
- 1.4% of all youth in the US identify as trans.
- 9.2 of all youth identify as gay/lesbian/Bisexual
- 2.2% of youth identify as questioning when it comes to their sexual orientation (UCLA Williams Institute 2020)





Disparities for LGBTQ Youth


- 52% of LGB youth have been bullied
- 56% of LGBTQ youth use drugs and alcohol
- 22% of LGBTQ youth have been sexually assaulted
- 55% of LGBTQ youth are experiencing depression
- 65% of LGBTQ youth are experiencing anxiety
- Suicide is the second leading cause of death for youth. LGBTQ youth are more that 4 times as likely to attempt suicide than their heterosexual peers. 41% of LGBTQ youth considered suicide. Youth that have experienced Conversion Therapy are 2.5 times likely to have reported multiple suicide attempts in the last year.
- LGBTQ youth have a 120% higher risk of becoming unhoused. Up to 40% of the 4.2 million unhoused identify as LGBTQ in 2023. Family rejection is the most common cause of becoming unhoused.
- Those that do become unhoused have long term consequences such as increased risk of exploitation (Prostitution and sex trafficking), violence, sexual violence, and physical abuse, depression, anxiety disorder, suicide, and increased use of substances to cope. (Trevor Project 2021)


Disparities For LGBYQ Youth For Riverside County

SUICIDE IDEATION BY SEXUAL ORIENTATION





- Thirteen percent of Grade 7, 16% of Grade 9 and 17% of Grade 11 students considered suicide in the past year.
- Higher percentage of female youth across all grades had thoughts of suicide/self-harm in the past year.
- Nearly 1 in every 2 LGBTQ youth in Grade 7 and 41% of Grade 9 and 11 youth considered suicide in the past year.
